



# Conservation Wildflower Seeds



We want people to "do something beautiful" with the wildflower seeds, such as turning vacant areas or lawns into a pretty spot with flowers. It will improve the natural and scenic landscape of Virginia and also be a welcome spot for pollinators such as bees, butterflies, and other beneficial insects.

Pollinators are needed to pollinate food crops, flowers, trees, and shrubs in Virginia, or anywhere. Native plants are considered the best choice. They supply an abundance of nectar and pollen that is suited for our native wildlife animals and insects. In addition to being low maintenance, they are generally pest free, drought tolerant, and have the ability to control erosion.

All of the seeds in our Virginia Conservation Mix are for plants that are native to Virginia. Native plants are good sources of food and shelter for wildlife, and naturally beautiful!

Our Virginia Conservation Mix contains the following seeds:

Yarrow , Ragweed , Bluestem, Splitbeard , Milkweed, Swamp Marsh , common Milkweed, Sedge, Fox , Partridge Pea , Coreopsis, Lanceleaf sand , Virginia Wild Rye , common Boneset, sweet-scented Joe Pye weed , Sneezeweed , Sunflower, Swamp Narrow Leaved , False Sunflower, Common Rush , Lespedeza, Roundhead Bushclover , Lespedeza, slender , Cardinal Flower, great blue Lobelia, Seedbox , Monkeyflower, Allegheny Square-stemmed , common Evening primrose, Virginia Rice Hulls and Virginia Oats to help with disbursing seeds, Switchgrass Blackwell , Beardtongue, smooth penstemon Foxglove, Black-eyed Susan , Brown-eyed Susan, Bluestem, Little Aldous , Woolgrass , showy Goldenrod, Gray Field Old Field Goldenrod, Indiangrass, Aster, Calico, Frost Aster, Purple Top Tridens , Blue Vervain, Golden Alexander.
